To achieve this goal, the Townsville HHS is looking for passionate Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander medical graduates and intern doctors to join our team during their internship and PGY2 year. With extensive mentoring, career guidance, and education opportunities throughout PGY1 and PGY2, the Townsville HHS is committed to improving the experience of Indigenous prevocational doctors.

About the Indigenous Prevocational Doctors Pathway

The Indigenous Doctor Pathway is designed to support Indigenous Interns and PGY2 doctors to achieve a successful

medical career in their chosen field. The pathway offers a bespoke prevocational training position within a tertiary hospital located within a regional area.

The pathway will focus on providing interns and PGY2 doctors with professional and cultural mentors. Doctors will be matched with Indigenous professionals to provide mentorship for clinical aspects of prevocational training but are also able to relate to the nuances faced by Indigenous medical officers. In addition, prevocational doctors may also ask to be matched to a medical officer whose specialty aligns with their career aspirations to provide specific career advice. Prevocational doctors will receive extensive career counselling, career integration and support from the Medical Education Unit, and from senior consultants aligned with various specialty colleges.

The Townsville HHS also provides additional cultural training and education to term supervisors to ensure Indigenous prevocational doctors are fully supported in every way during their training.

How to apply to the Indigenous Prevocational Doctors Pathway

Intern - Group A applicants are asked to apply via the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Intern Allocation Initiative (see pg. 10) within the Intern Recruitment Campaign, and preference Townsville first. The remaining non-Group A applicants should apply via the Intern Recruitment Campaign and preference Townsville first.

PGY2 – Please apply through the RMO Campaign and nominate Townsville as your first preference.

Both Interns and PGY2 doctors require the Indigenous Prevocational Doctors Pathway Application Form to be submitted to the TUH Medical Education and Workforce Services Team.
